Dave Edler – NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR!

Dave Edler was raised in Yakima and graduated from Eisenhower High School. He was a standout pitcher and third baseman for Ike and the Yakima Beetles American Legion team, which won the national championship in 1975 with a team coached by Bob Garretson Jr. After that victory, Dave was named "1975 National Player of the Year for American Legion Baseball." He then played for Coach "Bobo" Brayton in 1976-78 at Washington State, where he was an All-American, played in the College World Series and helped the Cougars win the division title four years in a row. Dave was drafted by the Seattle Mariners and played seven years of professional ball at third base, playing in the majors from 1980 through 1983. A decade later, from 1993 to 1998, Dave was

head coach of the Yakima Pepsi Beetles, directing them to the 1995 state Legion championship.

After his professional baseball career ended, he returned to Yakima and became Area Director for Young Life, leading a host of volunteers who built the local organization into one of the largest Young Life groups in the country. In 1995, he became the Senior Pastor of Yakima Foursquare Church, where he leads a congregation of nearly 1,000 people.

Dave was elected to two terms on the Yakima City Council (2003-2010) and served as Yakima's ceremonial mayor, selected by his fellow council members, from 2006 through 2010.

At the Parker Youth & Sports Foundation's live-stream event this year, Dave recalled that

his "greatest sports moment was winning the National American Legion World Series title with the Yakima Beetles in 1975. I will never forget flying back into Yakima from the World Series with my teammates and seeing Yakima's airport and streets filled with fans and signs. Sports creates opportunities. To come out of the pandemic, sports will be a critical factor to move from this devastating time and get kids re-engaged."

1975 AMERICAN LEGION WORLD SERIES HIGHLIGHTS

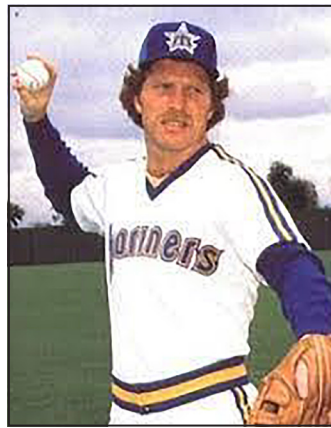
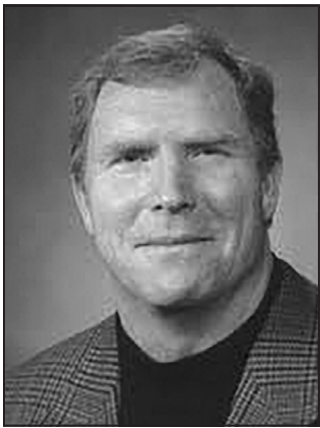
RAPID CITY, SD - Yakima, WA Post 36 claimed its second national championship since 1953 by winning the 50th anniversary American Legion World Series.

The championship game victory, an 8-4 decision over Cedar Rapids, capped an uphill effort by Yakima. The eventual champions lost on opening day before bouncing back through the elimination bracket.

David Edler, the American Legion Player of the Year, was the winning pitcher in the finals. He fanned 11 and also hit a home run. He also won the RBI award and tied for the total bases award.

The tournament, under perfect weather conditions, attracted over 27,000 fans.

Yakima ended the season with a 52-22 record.

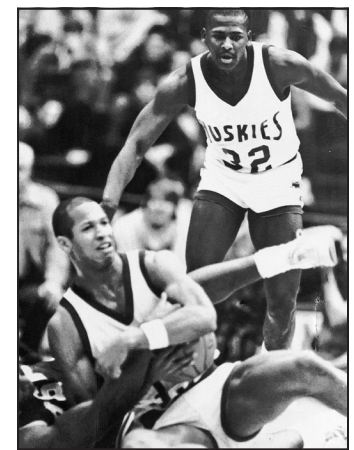
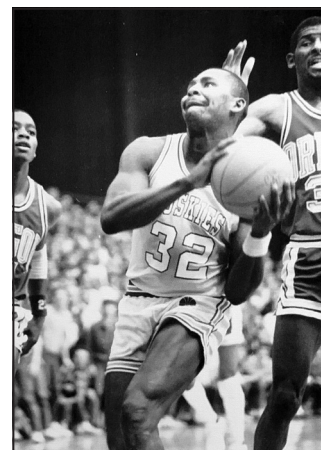
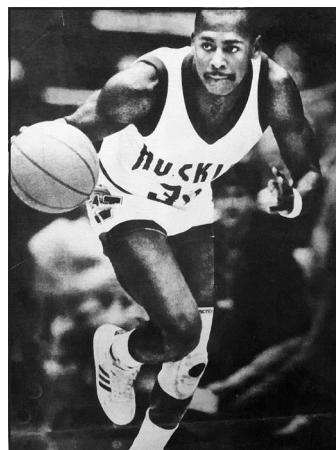
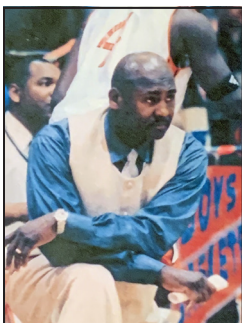


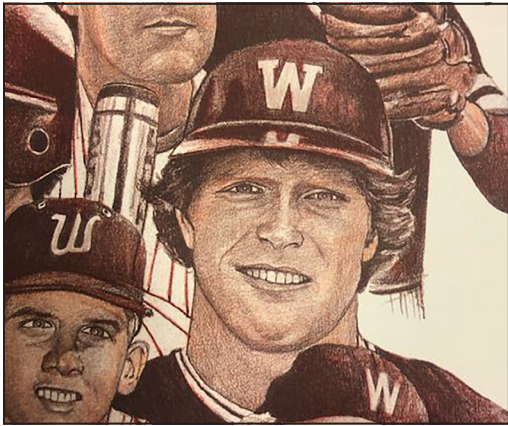
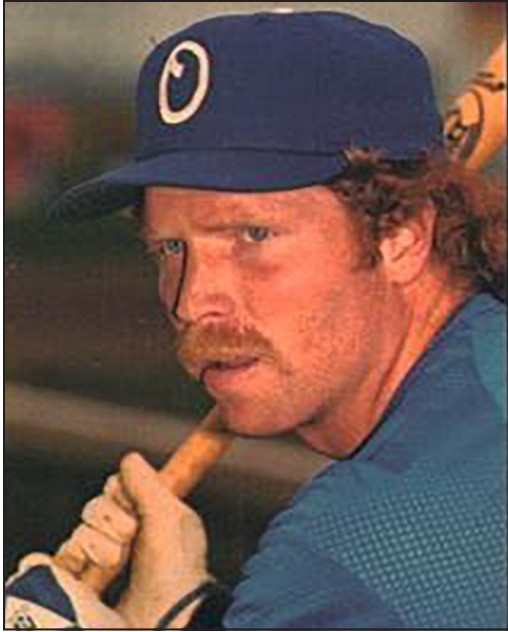
Shag Williams – ALL STAR ON THE COURT

Shag Williams is a true basketball legend of the Yakima Valley. He was raised in Yakima and graduated from Davis High School, where he was an All-State player. He was a three-year starter at the University of Washington on teams that advanced to the NCAA tournament all three years. As a sophomore in 1983-84, he averaged 6.1 points and 3.4 rebounds while playing alongside Detlef Schrempf and Christian Welp on a 24-7 team that

won two NCAA tournament games and the Seattle Times called "Marv Harshman's best team." He had his best statistical season as a senior in 1985-86, averaging 9.9 points and 7.2 rebounds on a 19-12 team under first-year coach Andy Russo.

Shag has lived in Yakima for over 30 years since his UW days, working as a professional fire fighter for 31 years and coaching both boys and girls basketball teams in school and club organi-





Coach Carol Finney – GIRLS SPORTS PIONEER, COACH, OFFICIAL, TOURNAMENT MANAGER

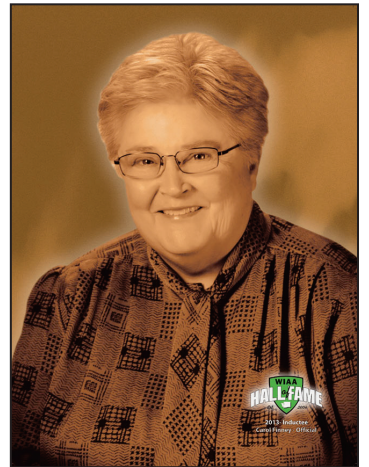
Carol Finney has been a pioneer in girls sports at Eisenhower High School, in the Yakima Valley and in the state. She started the girls basketball team and the girls track and field team at Ike and helped found leagues that eventually became part of the Big Nine League in both sports. She coached Ike softball for 21 years (1983-2004). She officiated basketball for 12 years and volleyball for 39 years. She has managed state volleyball and softball tournaments. She has had a hand in girls sports in Yakima and around the state since she took her first and only teaching job at Ike in 1963.

Her contributions were honored by the Yakima School District in May of 2018 when Ike's softball facility was dedicated as Carol Finney Field. She was inducted into the WIAA Hall of Fame in 2013.

Born in Halstad, Minn., she graduated from Edmonds High School in 1959. Four years later she graduated from Pacific Lutheran University and began 33 years of teaching at Ike (1963-96) and added another year in 2002-03. She was chairman of the physical education department for 30 years. She started the Ike track and field team in 1971, the year before Title IX was passed, and coached it for 10 years. Her 1975 team placed second in the state meet that was held in Goldendale at the time. Two of her softball teams qualified for the state tournament.

Carol officiated district volleyball tournaments for 25 years and worked state tournaments for 13 years. She managed the 1A, 2B and 1B State Volleyball Tournaments in the SunDome and the 2B and 1B State Softball Tournaments at Kiwanis Park. She was one of the founders of the Basketball and Volleyball Officiating Boards (Central Washington Board of Officials). She was appointed to the original Fee Review Committee and served as Region 5 Board Representative for 10 years.

She has been an Assigning Secretary for Central Washington Volleyball for over 25 years and part of the evaluation team every year. She was a recipient of the WOA Meritorious Award (1992), the YVIAA Distinguished Service Award (2005), and was inducted into the WOA Hall of Fame (2012).

zations. He coached boys basketball at Davis High School for 15 years, including seven years as head coach (1998-2005).

"The best part of growing up in Yakima on the East side was having a lot of mentors to look up to and help you make decisions," Shag says. "I lost my mom at an early age and Rev. Robert Trimble took me in as a young guy. He helped me with decisions and showed me the right way. At Washington Junior High, Mel Stubblefield showed me that there are many things out there a kid cannot do. He put the hammer down – but he also said there are things a kid can do. I needed to ask for help and do what I could do for my school and sport. At Davis High School, my basketball coach, Gene Rostvold, lifted me up and showed me the way to discipline and education. At the University of Washington, I was humble enough to try and fit in and do what I could do."

"To adults I say, what our kids are getting today is something we need to invest in. To kids I say, take advice from someone who has been there. A lot of kids do not always realize that we have many people in Yakima with amazing athletic histories who have been through it growing up."

Parker Youth and Sports Yakima Valley College Scholarship Awards

The **Faller Brayton Endowment fund** was established in 2007 to honor the contributions of long-time former YVC baseball and Hall of Fame coaches Bill "Butch" Faller and Chuck "Bobbo" Brayton.

The **Brayton Faller Award** was created in 2010 and funds YVC athletics with 3 quarters' worth of the NWAC-maximum scholarship and work aid packages. It is presented to returning sophomore baseball players selected by the YVC baseball coaches.

The 2021 recipient is:

Connor Coballes. Connor graduated from Gonzaga Prep in Spokane. This past spring he was a Second Team All-East Region infielder and an East Region Gold Glove infielder for the Yaks. In addition, he was named the overall NWAC Gold Glove Second Baseman. He is recognized as an even better leader and teammate.

Walter E. "Swede" Lindquist Award established by Parker Youth & Sports Foundation has established a scholarship to recognize Swede's long service to youth sports as an educator, athletic coach and administrator, and a sports official, particularly in basketball and football at all levels through college.

The 2021-22 co-recipients are:

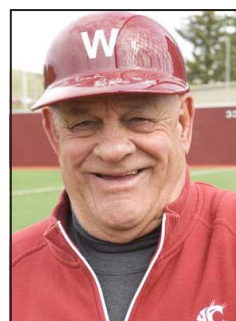

Following are comments from athletes, coaches, administrators and other individuals who participated in the Parker Youth & Sports "Sports Galore" Livestreamed program on March 25, 2021. These individuals work with kids, believe in kids and chose careers of teaching and administering youth athletics.

Alan Sillence: MC – Sports Galore; Sports Anchor, KIMA TV, former PYSF board member

Youth athletic programs have a large impact on the community. Athletics build discipline, sportsmanship and leadership in the people involved. They have a measurable economic impact when teams come to town and enjoy our businesses and facilities. Sports unite our Valley.

Darci Dekker: MC – Sports Galore; Yakima Valley College girls volleyball coach

48,000 students – over sixty percent of all youth in our valley, participate in sports. Sports is one of the most popular programs to develop youth leadership skills. Although school and sports were suspended for months, the Athletes have not "paused" working out to stay in shape. We are grateful for those who maintained the athletic programs now starting up again.

Kay Aberle: 2020 PYSF Legend, volleyball coach at Selah High School, five state champion teams.

I became involved in athletics as young girl because I had a desire to compete. When kids compete, they learn about life. Athletes learn to bring out the best in each other and learn that is how you win. I encourage players to surround themselves with good people. I tell players the hardest step is the first step and getting started. I encourage parents to let their child control their involvement with their sport.

Sarah Silvernail: 2020 PYSF Legend, volleyball All-American at WSU, All State at Eisenhower and Fife high schools

I did not grow up in the perfect world to succeed in sports. I had a single mom and if not for organizations like the Parker Foundation, my sisters and I could not have played volleyball or basketball. Sports kept us entwined with special families and supportive groups that helped us with rides and expenses. I value sports so much because the tools I learned got me to and through college. Sports gave me discipline and was the carrot that caused me to become the student and person I have become.

Trevor Greene: Superintendent, Yakima School District; National Principal of the Year at Toppenish High School

I am convinced that athletics is a strong motivator. We know students who come to school specifically for athletics, and they benefit from everything that is a part of athletics. I am thankful for all that Parker Youth & Sports has offered the

students in this Valley for 15 years.

Ray Funk: Athletic Director, Yakima Valley College, PYSF board member

Almost 50 years ago, some high school PE teachers brought a group of girls together to play basketball. We served punch and cookies after the games, and within three years the "Punch and Cookies League" became the Big Nine girls basketball league. The Eisenhower girls track program began after a girl came to me requesting a track team. I said if you can bring 10 girls to my office, we can have a track team. She had 10 girls in my office the next morning! Today, thanks to Parker Youth & Sports, a request and effort can support girls' sports.

Steve Mahre: 2008 PYSF Legend, 1984 Olympics silver medalist, World Cup Alpine ski racer

I played and loved a lot of sports – football, motocross, pole vault and ski racing. My opportunity was in skiing. My dream started at age 10 when I watched Jean Claude Kelly win three gold medals in the Olympics. I made it to the Olympics at age 19 and placed 13th. I made my goal. I tell kids to get outside - do sports – and do something physical to get set up for life.

Jerry Ward – Former Athletic Director, Yakima Valley College; Former President PYSF

The roots of the Parker Foundation go back to 1878 when the Parker family arrived in Yakima. The Foundation's history is totally connected to the history of the Valley. Between Shirley Parker and his mother Rose Larson, this city has reaped benefit after benefit.

Jeff Jamieson: Athletic Director, Assistant Principal, West Valley High School
