LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

DR. JOHN PLACE, MD - A DOCTOR FOR ALL SPORTS SEASONS

He was an orthopedic surgery specialist who walked the sidelines of all sports in all seasons to assist athletes in case of injury. He gave this protective service to Yakima Valley athletes for decades. The kids in football, basketball, track, wrestling, and soccer trusted this man and they loved him. He had an open pass to every athletic event in the region and enjoyed having a front-row seat. We lost Dr. Place on June 1, 2024, to a cardiac event that occurred while he was paddling his kayak in Yakima Greenway's Gap to Gap event. It was John's 40th Gap to Gap relay and he was ready - but his heart chose to give him eternal rest. Mary, his wife of 57 years, said, "John died doing what he loved, in a place he loved."

Dr. Place grew up in Lincoln, Nebraska. He attended the University of Colorado in Boulder, and then medical school at Baylor College in Texas. From there, he went to the Medical College of Wisconsin's Orthopedic Surgery Residency Program, where he met his wife, Mary. John served two years at Irwin Army Hospital at Ft. Riley, Kansas, treating injured personnel from the Vietnam War. In 1972, Major John Place received an honorable discharge with a Meritorious Service Medal. His wife, who is Yakima's former mayor, Mary Place, said, "John felt so fortunate and proud to serve the country he loved."

Dr. Place had over 52 years of diverse medical experience, especially in orthopedic surgery. After his military duty, he arrived in Yakima and became affiliated with many hospitals in our region. John had a ready and caring smile that relaxed patients - but this writer observed that when on duty in a medical ward, his nickname was "Dr. Hurricane". Nurses stood alert, paid attention, and had reports ready when they heard "Dr. Hurricane" had arrived. This man got things done!

Together, John and Mary raised 3 boys: Christopher, Matthew, and Michael. John was an Eagle Scout and became a scout leader with all 3 boys, who also became Eagle Scouts. After his retirement in 2015, Dr. Place volunteered his services at the Union Gospel Medical Clinic, doing orthopedic consultations and social work. For his dedication to health and his kindness to the people of our Valley, we proudly honor Dr. John Place for his Lifetime of Achievement to youth & sports!



"You Gotta Love It!"

PERSONAL LIFE

In 1976, Pat married his high school sweetheart, Kathy, and they raised their daughters, Karly and Mindy, as Pat's career success grew. In 2011, Pat's wife, Kathy, passed away following an illness. Pat

retired in 2014 to spend more time with his family. He also increased his participation in the affairs of state and national basketball associations. In 2015. married Kirsten he Danielson, and together they continue supporting youth and athletic programs. Eisenhower's head basketball



coach and former Fitterer player, Taylor Elmo said, "I had the privilege of playing for Coach Pat Fitterer all four years of high school, and it's something I'll always be proud of. He's a Hall of Fame coach, but more importantly, he's a Hall of Fame person. He pours into people. He gives freely of his time, shares his wisdom, and treats everyone with respect, no matter where they are in life. Playing for Coach Fitterer taught me what it means to be part of something bigger than myself. As he always used to say, "You gotta love it, baby!". We "gotta love" 2025 Yakima Valley Sports Legend, Pat Fitterer.

NACHES

Coach Pat Fitterer, a legendary figure in Washington

EARLY YEARS

high school basketball is ranked as the #2 winningest coach in basketball with 728 wins. His record boasts 18 league titles, 12 district titles, 23 state tournament appearances, 17 state trophies, and 2 state championships over a 37-year coaching career. A 43-year educator and threesport athlete, Pat's legacy spans athletics, community, and mentorship, earning him

induction into four Halls of Fame, the naming of an annual coaching award in his honor and having a basketball court named in his honor. Born and raised in Ellensburg, as the fifth of six athletically gifted siblings, Pat grew up immersed in sports. His passion for competition and leadership shaped his remarkable career.

HIGH SCHOOL

At Ellensburg High School, Pat graduated in 1971 as a three-sport star in football (Honorable Mention All-American), basketball (Honorable Mention All-Valley), and baseball (twice voted Most Inspirational Player on league championship teams). He also played in the state feeder baseball game.

COLLEGE

Pat played two years of football at Yakima Valley Community College before transferring to Central Washington State College, where he was the leading rusher on a league championship team under the legendary Coach Tom Parry. In track, he was a two-time District Champion sprinter, running the 100-yard dash in 9.5 seconds. He earned a B.S. in 1975 and a Master's in 1981.

CAREER

Pat began teaching and coaching in 1976, spending 11 years at Highland High School (Cowiche), two years at Kentwood (Kent), 13 years at Sehome (Bellingham), seven years at Eisenhower (Yakima), and four years at his alma mater, Ellensburg High School. He led Highland to a State 1A Championship in 1988 and Sehome to a State 4A Championship in 1996. At Eisenhower, he secured three district championships and two fourth-place state trophies at the 4A tournaments. Returning to his alma mater Ellensburg in 2010, he earned two state berths, including a 2012 guarterfinal appearance. Retiring in 2014 with 728 wins, Pat was named League Coach of the Year 16 times.

COMMUNITY

Locally and nationally, Pat's influence extends far beyond the court:

- 1998: Inducted into the Central Washington • University Athletics Hall of Fame.
- 2005: Honored as a National Federation of High School Distinguished Coach Contributor.
- 2007: Inducted into the WIBCA Hall of Fame and served as head coach of the USA National Select Basketball Team (2005-2007), going 6-0 and winning three gold medals.
- 2016: WIBCA established the Patrick Fitterer "You Gotta Love It" Positive Coach Contributor Award, recognizing coaches who transform players, schools, and communities.
- 2019: Inducted into the NHSBCA Court of Honor.
- 2022: Highland High School renamed its basketball court the "Pat Fitterer Court."
- 2024: Inducted into the Ellensburg High School Hall of Fame with his 10-0 mythical State champion football team.

COACH CHERYL HOLDEN

A Legacy of Excellence

Cheryl Holden, a Zillah native, is a celebrated figure in women's basketball, renowned for her remarkable nine (9) years coaching with Yakima's West Valley high school girls basketball, 13-year tenure as Head Women's Basketball Coach at Columbia Basin College (CBC) from 2001 to 2014. Inducted into the Northwest Athletic Conference (NWAC) Hall of Fame in 2018, Holden's legacy is defined by her extraordinary coaching achievements at both the high school and collegiate levels and her ongoing service as CBC's Vice President for Student Services.

EARLY YEARS

Raised in Zillah, Cheryl grew up in a sports-loving family with three sisters and a brother. The Holden siblings shared a passion for basketball and volleyball, fostering Cheryl's early love for athletics in a tight-knit community that championed sports.

HIGH SCHOOL

Cheryl attended Zillah High School, where girls' basketball was gaining traction in the 1970s. Playing in the old Zillah gym with men's basketball, she led the Zillah Leopards to three state tournament appearances, earning three state trophies. Cheryl surpassed 1,000 career points and still holds a share of the Yakima Valley's third-highest single-game scoring record with 44 points. She graduated in 1978.

A memorable moment from her high school years was a 1978 radio broadcast

of a Zillah girls' basketball game-the first of its kind. Organized so a teammate battling cancer could listen from home, the broadcast captured a victorious moment,

Cheryl recalled there was a radio broadcast of their 1978 state championship basketball game. It was to be the first basketball game broadcast on the radio – and it was a girl's game! There was a reason this special broadcast was set up one of Zillah players was very sick with cancer and could not come to the game. They wanted her to hear the game. She got to hear them win!

reflecting the community spirit that shaped Cheryl's career.

COLLEGE

Cheryl played college basketball and volleyball at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, earning a bachelor's degree in Physical Education and Health. She later obtained a Master of Arts in Management from Antioch University in Yellow Springs, Ohio, equipping her with leadership skills that defined her coaching and administrative career.

CAREER

Cheryl's coaching journey began at the high school level, where she demonstrated her talent for shaping young athletes and building competitive programs. At West Valley High School in Yakima, she served as head coach, leading the Rams to an impressive 117-21 record, reflecting an .848 winning percentage. Her crowning achievement at West Valley was guiding the team to the 2001 Class 3A state championship, showcasing her ability to foster

teamwork, discipline, and a winning culture. This success not only inspired a generation of young athletes in the Yakima Vallev but also established her as a skilled mentor, setting the stage for her transition to collegiate coaching.

In 2001, Cheryl became Head Women's Basketball Coach at Columbia Basin College, where she transformed the Hawks into a powerhouse. Over 13 years, her teams amassed a 268-114 record, achieving a 70% overall winning percentage and a 69% winning percentage in the East Region. Under her leadership, the Hawks made nine NWAC tournament



appearances in ten years, captured five East Region titles, and won

four NWAC Championships, making her one of only two coaches in NWAC history to achieve four championships. Her championship teams posted an extraordinary combined record of 110-14 (.887). Holden's squads won at least 20 games in six seasons, and in five seasons, they lost five or fewer games. Her coaching excellence earned her five East Region Coach of the Year awards and four NWAC Coach of the Year honors. Her ability to lead and inspire has cemented her status as a legendary figure in Northwest athletics.

In recognition of her impact, she was inducted into the NWAC Hall of Fame in 2018 and in 2022 CBC named its new competition court "Holden Court".

COMMUNITY

As CBC's Vice President for Student Services, Cheryl continues to serve the college and its community with the same dedication she brought to coaching. Her work at both West Valley High School and CBC has inspired countless athletes and coaches in the Yakima Valley and beyond. Reflecting on her journey, she said, "I am fortunate to have been raised in the Valley and to have a great town like Zillah as my home. As I reflect, I realize more and more how fortunate I have been." Her contributions have earned her the title of Yakima Valley Sports Legend, a testament to her lasting influence on and off the court.

KATIE BORTON BIRLEY

The Borton-Birle EARLY YEARS Katie Borton Birley grew up immersed in

basketball, a tradition running deep in her family. Her father, John, his cousin Bill, and Katie's cousin Teresa all played college basketball. The legacy continues with Katie's eldest son, Landen, who is headed to Idaho State University to play college basketball. Her brothers, Matt

and Eric, also played, as do her younger son, Austin, and daughter, Alison. Born and raised in Yakima, Katie graduated from West Valley High School. From a young age, she traveled the West Coast for tournaments, coached by her mother in soccer and her father in basketball.

HIGH SCHOOL

At West Valley High School (1996–1999), Katie was a three-sport standout, earning 12 varsity letters. In soccer, she started on the varsity team for four years, with the Rams placing fourth at state during her sophomore and junior seasons. In basketball, the talented guard played varsity all four years, amassing 1,376 career points—fifth on West Valley's all-time scoring list. Her team secured fifth place at state her sophomore year (1996–97) and third place her junior (1997–98) and senior (1998–99) years. Coached by Hall of Fame coach Cheryl Holden, Katie earned all-state first-team honors her senior year and set a 1999 state tournament scoring record. Her cousin Teresa later played on West Valley's 2001 state championship team, also under Coach Holden. In track and field, Katie competed in the 100m and 300m hurdles, long jump, and triple jump, winning the state triple jump title in 1999. That same year, she was named the Yakima Herald-Republic's Female Athlete of the Year, now part of the Yakima Valley Sports Awards.

COLLEGE

Katie earned a full-ride basketball scholarship to Colorado State University (CSU). She played on the 2001 Mountain West Conference tournament-winning team and competed in the NCAA tournaments in 2001 and 2002. Named to the Mountain West All-Conference Defensive Team in 2002–03, she ranked in the top 20 in the conference for assists, blocks, steals, and three-point shots. Her stats included a 34% field goal percentage, 33% three-point percentage, and

72.4% free-throw percentage. While at CSU, Katie met her husband, Andy Birley, a member of the men's basketball team. After graduating, they married and

returned to Yakima to work in the family orchard business.

PERSONAL LIFE & COMMUNITY IMPACT

Katie and Andy have three children—Landen (18), Austin (15), and Alison (8)—all of whom play

basketball. This past year, Landen and Austin played together on West Valley's basketball team, which placed fifth at state. Landen, a senior, surpassed

his cousin Teresa's scoring record to become West Valley's all-time leading scorer with 1,746 points. Katie coaches Alison's

basketball team, saying, "It's fun to coach her!" Reflecting on her own journey, Katie cherishes her time playing alongside her cousin Teresa, her nextdoor neighbor and best friend, during two years of high school and competing against her in college. Katie Borton Birley's

story is one of talent, dedication, and family. Her past achievements inspire, her present Contributions. We proudly salute Katie as a Parker Youth & Sports

COACH ELI JUAREZ

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A Legacy of Hard Work, Respect & Family

Eli Juarez was one of seven children born to migrant farmworker parents, Eliseo and Rosa Juarez. He grew up in Wapato. His family settled there during the school year, working hop fields and picking berries and tree fruit in migrant camps during the summer. A basketball star at Wapato High School, Eli went on to shine at Walla Walla Community College and Whitman

College, becoming a legendary coach with over 500 wins, 11 conference titles, and a historic induction as the first Latino in the Washington Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association (WIBCA) Hall of Fame.

EARLY YEARS

Eli's earliest basketball memories stem from playing in migrant camps. Growing up in a hardworking family, he learned the values of dedication and respect, which would define his life and career.


HIGH SCHOOL & COLLEGE

At Wapato High School, Eli excelled in football, baseball, and basketball, earning praise and scholarship offers. Graduating in 1975, he chose to stay close to family while pursuing higher education. Recruited to Walla Walla Community College and later Whitman College, Eli thrived as a basketball player. His passion for coaching emerged while leading an AAU team during his time at Whitman, setting the stage for his remarkable career.

CAREER

Eli began teaching and coaching in Dayton, where he quickly found success. Recruited to rebuild Wenatchee's

basketball program, he transformed it into a winner. He later returned to his alma mater, Wapato High School, before he was called back to coaching in the Big 9 at Davis High School. He coached at Davis for 20 years and led the team to a state championship in 2012—featuring NFL star Cooper Kupp— and to second place in 2015. The teams played in nine state tournament appearances. Coach Juarez had 527 career wins, two undefeated seasons at Dayton, and records for being the most winning coach at two Big 9 schools. Eli was named Big 9 Coach of the Year multiple times and became the league's longest-



COMMUNITY

A first-generation American, Eli's achievements extend beyond the court. In 2021, he made history as the first Latino inducted into the WIBCA Hall of Fame. His commitment to coaching and mentoring young athletes reflects his deep ties to the Yakima Valley and his role as a trailblazer for Latino representation in sports.

PERSONAL LIFE

Eli met his wife, Brenda, a fellow basketball standout, at Walla Walla Community College. Family guided his career decisions, and he coached all three of their children—two sons and a daughter—during his 43-year tenure at Dayton, Wenatchee, Wapato, and Davis High Schools. Eli credits his success to the role models who shaped him, emphasizing, "I've been incredibly lucky to learn from others. My commitment to hard work and respect defined who I became." Coach Eli Juarez's journey from migrant camps to the WIBCA Hall of Fame embodies dedication, family, and community. A true Parker Youth & Sports Legend, his story inspires generations.





MARJON BEAUCHAMP

Faith, Purpose and Practice!

MarJon Beauchamp, a Yakima native and Eisenhower High School graduate, made history as the first Yakima Valley player selected in the first round of the NBA Draft, picked 24th overall by the Milwaukee Bucks in 2022. A small forward known for his athleticism and dedication, MarJon's journey from Yakima to the NBA reflects his unwavering faith and commitment to his profession.

EARLY YEARS

Born in Yakima, MarJon grew up with one brother and a twin brother and sister. Standing 6 feet 7 inches and weighing 199 pounds, he developed a passion for basketball in his hometown, setting the stage for his professional career.

HIGH SCHOOL

Seeking stronger competition, MarJon moved to Seattle to play at Nathan Hale High School under coach Brandon Roy. There, he led the team to a 29–0 record, a Washington Interscholastic Activities Association (WIAA) Class 3A state title, and the No. 1 national ranking. As a sophomore, he transferred to Garfield High School, winning a Class 4A state championship and reaching the quarterfinals at High School Nationals. For his junior year, he joined Rainier Beach High School, earning Seattle 3A Metro League MVP honors after leading the team to league and district titles and a Class 3A state semifinal. MarJon spent his senior year at a new basketball program in Glendale, Arizona, before returning to Yakima to graduate from Eisenhower High School.

COLLEGE AND CAREER

After high school, MarJon attended basketball training camps and enrolled at Yakima Valley College in 2021, where he averaged 30.7 points on 52.5% shooting, 10.5 rebounds, and 4.8 assists over 36.4 minutes. As a player he was known as a wing or small forward. A consensus four-star recruit, he attracted offers from programs like Washington and earned a four and five-star rating from recruiting websites on the AAU circuit. Drafted by the Milwaukee Bucks in 2022, he played three NBA seasons with the Bucks, Clippers, and Knicks, averaging 4.1 points across 135 regular-season games. In March 2025, he signed a two-way contract with the New York Knicks and their G League affiliate, the Westchester Knicks.

COMMUNITY AND PERSONAL LIFE

MarJon remains deeply connected to Yakima, returning during NBA breaks to spend time with his family. When home in Yakima, MarJon hosts free basketball clinics for local youth, leads drills, and supports charity auctions by signing memorabilia. Of Native American descent, MarJon credits his faith for guiding him through challenges, and he balances hard work with prayer. His excellence in play and his dedication to his craft and community earned him recognition as a 2025 Yakima Valley Sports Legend.

CHRISTINE SILVERNAIL

One of Santa Clara University's Greatest!

Christine Silvernail, a record-setting basketball player and team leader, left an indelible mark on West Valley High School and Santa Clara University. Honored posthumously as a Yakima Valley Sports Legend, her athletic brilliance and inspiring legacy continue to shine.


EARLY YEARS

Born in Spokane, Christine was the second of four athletically gifted siblings-David, Christine, Sarah, and Liz. Their mother, Sandy Kahle, was a dedicated sports mom, supporting her four children through year-round athletics. David, the eldest, organized family strength contests to toughen his sisters for competition, fostering their grit and heart. David did a great job of family coaching as Christine and Sarah both earned Player of the Year honors in their college conferences-Christine in the West Coast Conference (WCC) for basketball in 1994, and Sarah in the Pac-10 for volleyball in 1997.



HIGH SCHOOL

In 1988, the family moved to Yakima, where Christine enrolled at West Valley High School. Graduating in 1990, she excelled as a three-sport athlete in volleyball, track, and basketball. Known for her speed, exceptional free-throw shooting, and leadership, Christine



dominated basketball year-round, often winning free-throw contests. Coming from a family that always helps each other, Christine coached her younger sister Sarah- who attended a rival school - by showing Sarah where to stand in order to beat her. Her discipline and work ethic earned her a full-ride basketball scholarship to Santa Clara University in California.

COLLEGE

At Santa Clara, Christine was an immediate standout on the court and in the classroom. A Santa Clara University Athletics representative stated, "Christine Silvernail was one of the greatest players in the history of Santa Clara women's basketball." A two-time All-WCC First Team selection and the 1994 WCC Player of the Year, she led the Broncos to four consecutive WCC regular-season titles, one WCC Tournament championship, a WNIT title in her freshman year, and two NCAA Tournament appearances. The team achieved four winning seasons, three with over 20 victories. As a junior, Christine and teammate Melissa King formed Santa Clara's No. 2 all-time scoring tandem, contributing 421 of their 985 points. In her senior year, she led the team in scoring (19.6 ppg), field goal percentage (.488), free-throw percentage (.834), rebounding (7.4 rpg), and blocks (15). Christine remains the school's fourth-leading scorer with 1,325 points and sixth all-time rebounder with 536. In 1994, she graduated with honors, earning a Bachelor of Business Accounting degree.

CAREER

After graduating, Christine played semi-pro basketball in the Luxembourg Basketball League. Returning to the U.S., she was a manager at a packaging company in Auburn, Washington, and played a season of semi-pro rugby. Tragically, in October 1997, Christine passed away in a car accident near Tacoma at age 25. In 2008, she was inducted into the Santa Clara University Athletic Hall of Fame and celebrated for her achievements and character.

COMMUNITY AND PERSONAL

Christine had a strong family cheering squad in Yakima and she gained confidence from the support of her aunt and uncle Kathleen and Dr. Tim O'Connor and other family members. Her family remembers Christine as the one who always remembers birthdays, anniversaries and special days This sports-centered family includes Christine's brother David, a college baseball player, sister Sarah, a volleyball star at Washington State University, and youngest sister Liz, who played varsity volleyball, basketball, and tennis. Liz continues to enjoy tennis today. Today, we honor Christine Silvernail as a gifted leader, scholar, an accomplished athlete and a 2025 Yakima Valley Sports Legend whose legacy endures.



ALAN SILLENCE

Count on Total Coverage



Alan Sillence, a Seattle native and University of Washington graduate, dedicated 47 years to the television industry, including 31 years in Yakima. With a passion for sports and storytelling, he became a celebrated sports broadcaster, earning numerous awards and leaving an enduring legacy in the Yakima Valley.

EARLY YEARS

Growing up in Seattle, Alan played various sports until high school. His father, Roy, a longtime television director at KOMO TV-ABC, sparked his early interest in the industry, setting the foundation for his career.

HIGH SCHOOL & COLLEGE

Alan attended Nathan Hale High School in Seattle, where his love for sports and media began to take shape. While studying at the University of Washington in 1978, Alan explored radio and interned at KOMO TV in Seattle, later working as a film editor and news production assistant. After earning his bachelor's degree, he joined KNDO-NBC in Yakima as a sports broadcaster, then moved to KGGM-TV (now KRQE-CBS) in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

CAREER

Known for his "total coverage," Alan filmed and reported on thousands of football, baseball, basketball, and other sports events, often sacrificing weekends to capture the action. In New Mexico, he won the Associated Press Award for Best Newscast. Returning to Yakima in 1994, he became KIMA-TV-CBS's sports director, earning the

In 1994, he became KIMA-TV-CBS's sports director, earnin Associated Press First-Place Award for Best Sportscaster in Washington State among other honors. There is more to the story than awards. Alan's passion shone through, as he noted, "I work weekends because I am doing what I love to do with people that I love to be with and who are appreciative."

COMMUNITY IMPACT

As KIMA-TV's sports director, Alan served 20 years on the Yakima Sports Commission and Yakima Monday Morning Quarterbacks, and as a board member of the Parker Youth & Sports Foundation. His volunteer work

bolstered Yakima's statewide athletic reputation and drove economic growth through sports programs. Current KIMA broadcaster Austin Peppers credits Alan's emphasis on local sports, saying, "Alan put an emphasis on covering local sports, and that's something I've learned from and strive to do every day. It is truly special to work with someone I looked up to as a kid."

PERSONAL LIFE

In 2021, the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences honored Alan with the Silver Circle Award, recognizing him as "the gold standard of small market sports journalism" and an ambassador for Yakima's athletes and programs. After retiring in



January 2025, Alan enjoys golf, travel, and family time in Seattle. Eisenhower High School's National Hall of Fame Cross Country Coach Phil English voiced this praise, "Alan's influence and importance across the Valley knows no bounds. We will look for Alan to be out running the mile after retirement." Alan is known for signing off each broadcast with "I'm Out!." We can now say Alan Sillence is never "out" because he is a permanent Sports Legend of the Yakima Valley.



In 2021, the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences presented Alan the "Silver Circle Award.
