

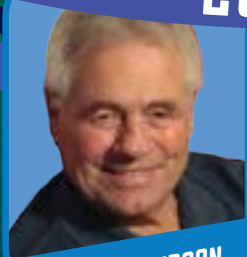

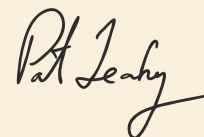

Rich Austin is celebrating his 20th year as the Director of Sports Development for the Yakima Valley Sports Commission. Rich focuses on economic development through sports in the Yakima Valley. When you talk to his friends, colleagues, partners, or family, you hear the same question: "What would we do without Rich?"

Born in Fayetteville, NC, Rich moved to the Yakima Valley as a young child. He graduated from East Valley HS and received his AA from YVC before attending Washington State University

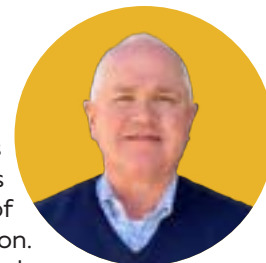
where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree. He met his wife, Jenn of 17 years, in Yakima. They are the parents of three daughters, Chanteena, Addison, and Avery (Connor), and two grandsons, Jacob and Ayden.

Rich is a long-standing figure in the region's sports tourism and community development world. Prior to the Sports Commission, he worked 18 years for the Yakima Sun Kings, in a variety of roles, including General Manager. He was a part of six championship teams and won the Continental Basketball Association's General Manager of the Year award in 2006. In between stints with the Sun Kings, Rich spent two seasons as the Sports Communications Manager with the

NBA's Portland Trail Blazers. He holds a Sports Tourism Strategist (STS) certification from Sports ETA. He is deeply involved in bringing dozens of WIAA State Championships to central Washington.

As a hands-on advocate for sports, he has served on an amazing number of boards, including the Greater Yakima Chamber of Commerce-19 years, Leadership Yakima-24 years, Sozo Sports of Central Washington-11 years, Yakima Schools Foundation-6 years, Parker Youth & Sports Foundation-10 years, Washington Youth Soccer-6 years, Team Yakima Volleyball-12 years, Downtown Yakima Rotary-3 years and Union Gap Lodging Tax Committee-12 years.

Again, we ask: "What would we do without Rich?" Rich Austin's passion for sports resulted in a career of sports and community success. 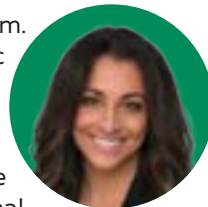


INTRODUCING NEW FACES TO THE PARKER TEAM!

ON THE WORLD'S STAGE Yakima Valley Olympians!

An Olympic year occurs every two years – alternating the winter and spring Olympics. It is extraordinarily rare for a region our size – just 250,000 people – to have athletes so elite that they have competed in the Olympics. The Yakima Valley is fortunate to have had five Olympians compete on the world stage and four of them have won medals. 5 medals – 3 gold medals, and 2 silver medals. We salute the Olympics this year – the teams and individuals who train in the shadows yet bring enormous pride to Americans with their skill and heart.

The Yakima Valley has produced a select and highly decorated group of Olympic athletes. Local legends include the Mahre twins who famously swept the podium in alpine skiing, a gold-medalist heavyweight boxer, USA Basketball team member, and a track standout. Salute these Yakima Valley Olympians of the past as Phil Mahre joins us at the Banquet on August 28th!

WINTER OLYMPIANS

ALPINE SKIING

PHIL MAHRE (Naches): Born in Yakima, Phil won one gold medal in the slalom and his twin brother Steve took silver at the 1984 Sarajevo Winter Olympics. Phil won a silver medal at Lake Placid, 1989. Phil was named the greatest male U.S. skier of all time by the United States Ski and Snowboard Association in 2002. He also Won 3 consecutive World Cup Titles in 1982, 83, 84.

STEVE MAHRE (Naches): Phil's twin brother, also born in Yakima, won the silver medal in the slalom directly behind his brother at the 1984 Sarajevo Games. He previously took gold in giant slalom at the 1982 World Championships. Steve placed 4th and 3rd in the 1981 and 1982 World Cup

BOXING

PETE RADEMACHER (Tieton, Yakima Valley College): Born in Tieton, WA. Pete won a gold medal in heavyweight boxing at the 1956 Melbourne Olympics. He was a multisport athlete at Yakima Valley College.

BASKETBALL

RALPH BISHOP: Graduate of Davis High School and Yakima Valley College, Bishop was a captain of the University of Washington basketball team and went on to win the gold medal with the U.S. Olympic basketball

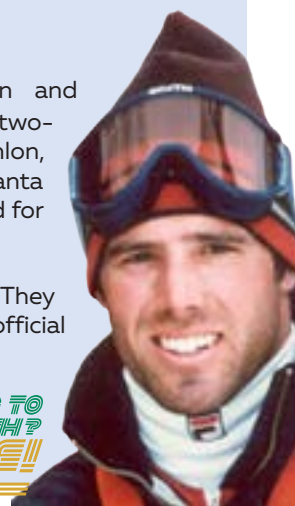
TRACK AND FIELD

KELLY BLAIR (Prosser): Born and raised in Prosser, WA. Kelly was a two-time Olympian in the heptathlon, competing in both the 1996 Atlanta Games – placing 8th and qualified for the 2000 Sydney Games.

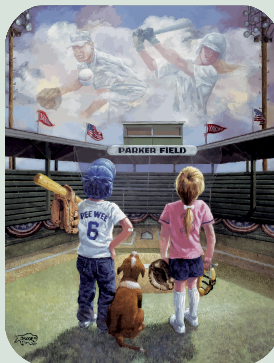
LETTER FROM MIKE CARNAHAN

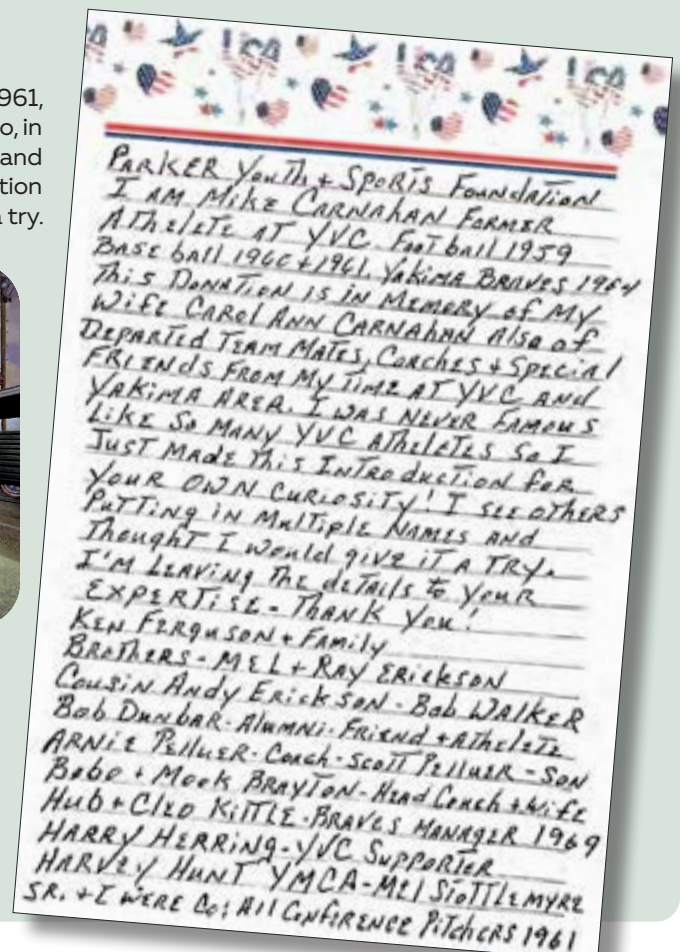

GEORGE "SPUD" EDMONDSON

"A FRIEND TO ALL" (1946-2024)

GEORGE "SPUD" EDMONDSON (1946-2024) – He was truly "A Friend to All" who knew him, played sports with him, sat in the bleachers with him, volunteered with him. This legend athlete and sportsman was a co-captain of the 1964 4A state-champion IKE football team, was a starter for IKE's state-ranked basketball team and for IKE's baseball team, and for Yakima's American Legion baseball team. He accepted a University of Oregon scholarship as a football linebacker for the Ducks and in 1988 became a first-round inductee into the Eisenhower Hall of Fame.

EARLY YEARS & HIGH SCHOOL

Spud was raised in Yakima where he attended Nob Hill Elementary, Wilson Jr High & Eisenhower Sr. High, graduating in 1965. Living close to the school gave him many opportunities to play with the neighborhood kids. Unknowingly he was building their future team. It was apparent at an early age that he was a gifted athlete and excelled at all sports, including swimming and track. He completed his high school career by lettering all three years in football, basketball and baseball.



COLLEGE

Spud was awarded a football scholarship to attend the University of Oregon, where he pledged Beta Theta Phi. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Recreation & Park Management.

CAREER

After graduation from college, he worked for WA State Child Support before transferring to the WA State Dept. of Corrections as a probation & parole officer. He later served as a temporary work-release supervisor and community corrections specialist.



COMMUNITY

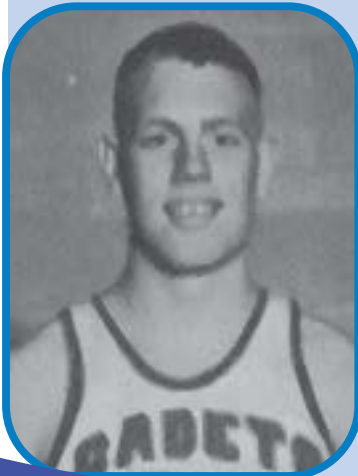
As an avid sports fan, he participated in various recreational sports, including slo-pitch softball, flag football and basketball. At the time of his passing, he had served as president of the Yakima Monday Morning Quarterbacks for 10 years while organizing the staffing and refreshments for Hospitality Rooms for referees and coaches of Yakima's local regional and state tournaments.

In the words of a fellow Quarterback, "Spud's passing is as if a sports museum burned down." He served 6 years on the board of the Parker Youth Foundation and for 21 years played a key role in the successful implementation of the foundation's High Hopes Golf Tournament fundraiser.

PERSONAL LIFE

Throughout his life, he attended countless sports events locally and on his many trips across the country, which provided many opportunities for him to drive by or walk on school campuses, reminiscing and claiming he "lived in the best of times." He was and will always be our family "MVP". Throughout his life, he attended local sporting events, which also included road trips that provided many opportunities for him to drive by or walk on many school campuses, reminiscing and claiming he "lived in the best of times." He was and will always be the family "MVP" Spud is survived by his wife Gay, 5 children, 12 grandchildren & 6 great grandchildren.

This year we honor Spud as an unstoppable athlete, leader, organizer, participant, and fan of all local sports whose legacy of friendship will shine into the future of this community.



THE FABULOUS FIVE 2026 LEGENDS

ANGIE PLEASANT CRAWFORD

SALUTING LEADERSHIP & LOYALTY



ANGIE PLEASANT CRAWFORD was born and raised into a family with deep roots in the Yakima Valley. A 1986 graduate of Davis High school, she was a three sport first team Big Nine selection in volleyball basketball and track. As three-time letterwoman in basketball, volleyball and Track & Field, she received nine varsity letters at Davis. Angie was named All Big Nine and All-State in basketball, averaging 18 points a game. In track and field, she holds the Davis shot put record of 42 feet. She attended the University Idaho where she played basketball two years. She then enlisted into the US Navy for a 25-year career. She continued to play basketball and received MVP honors in the Navy. Angie worked 15 years as a Division I college and high school basketball official. She then retired to become a head High School basketball coach in California where she coached two state championship teams.



EARLY LIFE & HIGH SCHOOL

Angie's administrators and coaches say Angie was a mainstay at Davis High School in turning the volleyball, basketball and track programs into Big Nine League title contenders. In her Senior year, she was selected All Big Nine and All-State for basketball, averaging 18 points, five

rebounds and four steals and four assists per game, finishing second in scoring in the Big Nine. Also, in her senior year, she earned a trip to the Track and Field State Championships in the High Jump and Shot Put, where she took second place in the Shot Put. She was captain of the Davis volleyball team. Angie says, "My best Davis sport memory is finally beating IKE in volleyball and seeing it in the Newspaper. My best non-sport high school memory is the Davis Follies. It was fun performing and watching others perform." Angie finished her senior year being awarded the Yakima Herald's Republic's Athletic Co-Contributor of Year Award.

COLLEGE & CAREER

After two years at the University of Idaho, Angie enlisted into the Navy to serve her country. She served 25 years and retired as a Naval Officer with the rank of Lieutenant Commander (LCDR). During her military career, Angie was an Intelligence Officer and served in the 5th and 7th Fleets. The 5th Fleet was a combat area assignment. Angie also played on the All-Navy Basketball team averaging 30 points a game, winning a Championship and receiving MVP honors. The teams were a mixture of Navy and Marine personnel.

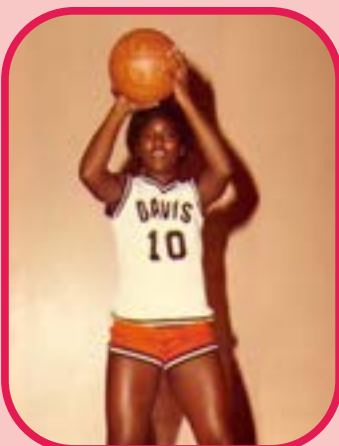
While in the Navy, Crawford practiced Martial Arts for 10 years earning two black belts - one in the Tae Kwon Do and one in Karate. She became a Martial Arts instructor and she says, "I was in the best shape of my life. I would have loved to open my own Martial Arts School, but timing was not right. I was too busy with the Navy and refereeing basketball, and my family."

Angie became a NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Official and officiated ACC, the Big East, MEAC, and Colonial conferences for 15 years. She was selected to officiate the first round of the NCAA basketball tournament and she was selected two years in a row to officiate the new summer NBA Basketball League (1999-2000). About officiating, Angie states, "I had a blast traveling and being out there on the floor. It was like second nature to me."

Crawford then coached High School Girl's Basketball for eight years. She won two California State High School Championships. Angie states about basketball, "It was a blessing. I loved being a mentor on and off the court."

PERSONAL & COMMUNITY

At home in San Diego, California, Angie states her biggest accomplishments are being married for 30 years and watching her daughter, Jasmyn compete as a collegiate track & field athlete. Jasmyn competed in running, relay and long jump events where she holds school and NCAA records. Angie's husband is Captain Tom Crawford who is retiring next year after 40 years in the Navy as an Aerospace Maintenance Duty Officer. He has served in many combat areas. This past May, their daughter Jasmyn graduated with her Master's degree and finished her collegiate track as a 4-time-Track All American. When their schedule allows Angie comes home to visit family in Yakima. Angie's contribution to athletics have earned her the title of Sport Legend of the Yakima Valley!



THE FABULOUS FI

RYAN LEAHY

KEEP IT SHORT AND SIMPLE



RYAN LEAHY likes things kept short and simple. He is direct – responsive – brief and consistent on the field or with communication. This disposition has served him well in his athletic and business career. This Eisenhower H.S. 3-sport first team Big Nine pick in football, basketball, and baseball, played in the All-State football game and was the center on the state qualifying IKE basketball team, and was the MVP of the high school feeder game. He was a American Legion Beetle's Baseball player. Leahy was a 3-year starting guard at University of Notre Dame under Coach Lou Holtz and a 2-year team captain playing in five bowl games. He signed with the Arizona Cardinals in 1995 and played 2 years for the NFL Europe Amsterdam Admirals.



EARLY LIFE

Ryan was born in Kennewick, Washington and grew up in a sports-loving family with his older brother Pat – Notre Dame baseball pitcher drafted by the Florida Marlins, and sister Regan – University of North Carolina Track and "ACC Top Six". He arrived in Yakima in the second grade. He learned early that his paternal grandfather, Frank Leahy, was a former 13-year football coach at Notre Dame with 4 National Championships and an "All-Time" winning percentage of 0.854 – the second best in the NCAA Division I. Ryan also learned the Notre Dame fight song early because Gram Leahy had them sing it to get ice cream. Ryan benefited from Yakima Little League and American Legion Beetle baseball with Coaches Jim Scoggins and Mike Moore. He played YMCA Basketball with Coach Bill Douglas and wrestled under Coach Bob Spain. As a heavy weight 8-year-old wrestler, Ryan qualified for the National Youth Wrestling Tournament in Boise, ID and took 2nd place.

HIGH SCHOOL

Ryan was an all-state lineman as an Eisenhower football play and listed #87 in USA Today's 1991 national football ranking. Ryan states IKE Coaches Gavin, Rogers, and Balmer were "absolutely great" coaches in the weight room and on the field. Ryan is remembered at IKE for his regional-record shooting perfection in basketball when he was 12 for 12 from the field and 3 for 3 free-throw line for 27 points in a regional tournament upset of Spokane champion Ferris High School. Ryan credits Coach Felton who knew how to motivate team members to play their best game. In baseball, Ryan was named MVP of 1991 Regional HS Feeder baseball game pitching four scoreless innings and hitting a home run.

COLLEGE

The Irish were second in the country Ryan's sophomore year. At 6'4" and 290 lbs., he played in 44 games and was a team captain his junior and senior year. Ryan played as a right guard like his father and grandfather. In 1995, Ryan received the Moose Krause Lineman of the year award and played in the East -West National Shriner game at Stanford. He graduated in 1995 with a degree in economics. His friendship with the great Coach Lou Holtz continued until Lou's passing this year.

CAREER

In 1995, Ryan was drafted by the Arizona Cardinals and played for 2-years NFL Europe for Amsterdam Admirals. He had a preseason with Green Bay Packers. Ryan's MBA Degree is from Kellogg School of Management Northwestern University. He has been a bond trader for 23 years.

PERSONAL & COMMUNITY

In his spare time, Ryan enjoys time with his family and attending his daughters athletic and performing events. He participates in downtown Chicago "Aging Men Basketball". His daughters Reese and Reilly will both be in college this fall. We proudly salute Ryan as a Parker Youth & Sports Legend of the Yakima Valley.

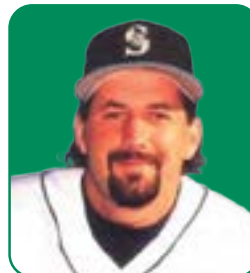

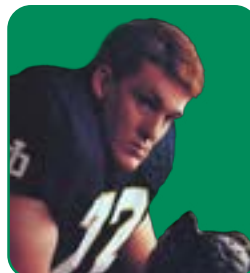

UNBEATEN



ANNIE SCHEFTER KNUDSON "Annie excels at everything. She's a 4.0 student. She's an athlete in every sense of the word, and she's more competitive than almost any of the girls I've ever seen," stated Annie's high school Coach Schubert. Annie was West Valley High Schools' (WV) 2001 state champion midfielder who received All-American honors with the National Soccer Coaches Assoc. of America and Parade Magazine. She totaled 47 goals, and 25 assists, helping West Valley to a 24-0 state record. They were unbeaten. She was a four-year point guard for Lady Ram basketball, winning the 2001 State basketball title in 2001. Annie was the Notre Dame National Champion soccer midfielder who nailed the penalty kick in a shootout giving Notre Dame the 2004 championship (25-1-1) over UCLA in the national final game. She played for the US National U-19 women's team.



EARLY LIFE

Annie grew up in a sports centered home as the youngest of the five Schefter children, with a Dad who had played college tennis at Notre Dame and her mom was a scheduling whiz. She was introduced to soccer at an early age playing with her skilled, and competitive older brothers, who also played collegiate soccer. Annie said they used to play in the backyard or in the basement. But the game of basketball challenged her focus on soccer. She was 5'8" and the starting point guard on the 2001 state champion WV girl's basketball team. The enjoyment of basketball was tempting, but because of the family soccer history, and as she says, "Because I am not 6'2", - her favorite sport for development work was soccer.

HIGH SCHOOL

During Annie's high school days, night time work outs, or with dad were the norm in her home. As a senior on West Valley's 2001 Class 3A state champion soccer team, she played on Yakima Valley's only unbeaten and untied girls soccer team. Annie was invited to play on an Olympic Developmental Program team and experienced exciting foreign travel for competitions. She visited Stanford, University of Washington and Notre Dame for college soccer and was most comfortable with her dad's Alma mater, Notre Dame. Her mother, Gracie, had attended Saint Mary's College, just two miles away.

COLLEGE

Notre Dame women's soccer Coach Randy Waldrum said, "Annie's point guard skills are very comparable to her strength on the soccer field. She has great vision and passing skills and really knows how to read the field and control the play." Annie injured her knee as a freshman and could not play that year. Then, three years after recovering from a knee injury, Schefter kicked her penalty kick in a shootout that gave Notre Dame a victory over UCLA in the 2004 national final.



CAREER & COMMUNITY

After graduating from Notre Dame, Annie entered dental school where she met her husband, Jeff. They settled near Seattle and share a dental office together. They have three children - ages 12, 10, and 8.

Annie continues to enjoy athletics. In 2020 and 2021, Annie and her dad, Dr. Rob Schefter played in the national father-daughter USTA Tennis Tournament. In 2021, they won first place and were undefeated going 5-0 over two days. "Unbeaten Again" could be like the title of a song written for Annie Schefter. Parker Youth & Sports honors Annie Schefter Knudson as a Sport Legend of the Yakima Valley Award!

DAVID TRIMBLE SR.

ALWAYS READY

DAVID TRIMBLE SR understands timing and he is always ready. Ready for the game, ready for the ball and ready to throw or run if that is what counts! In 1979, David was A.C. Davis High School's first ever three-sport first team Big Nine selection in football, basketball, and baseball. That was the year David helped Davis baseball to 3rd place in WIAA, then helped Beatles win the 1979 American Legion World Series Championship. In his senior year in high school he was named to the All State Football and Basketball team. That year he was also selected to play Quarterback in the All-State Football game and selected to play in the All-State Basketball Game. In 1980, David was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays and played for one year. He then accepted a football scholarship to the University of Washington and played in four consecutive bowl games as a receiver. When life moves fast – be ready!



EARLY LIFE & HIGH SCHOOL

In 1977, as a sophomore at Davis High School, Trimble earned his first recognition when he received honorable mention on the Big Nine All Conference basketball team. The name David Trimble would appear many times in the newspaper!

In 1978 – his junior year, Trimble was named All Big Nine first team in football as a receiver. and 2nd team in basketball. In 1979, Trimble was named 2nd team All State basketball. He also helped the Davis baseball team to a 3rd place finish at the WIAA State Championships. In the summer of 1979, Trimble played on the American Legion Yakima Beatles baseball team that won the 1979 World Series. In 1979-1980 – his senior year, Trimble was football first team all-Big 9 as a QB selected to play in the All-State Football game. He also was named to the basketball first team all-Big 9, and Trimble took 3rd that year at state. Trimble was also selected to play in the all-state basketball game and earned the trifecta when he was also named to the All Big Nine baseball team.

COLLEGE

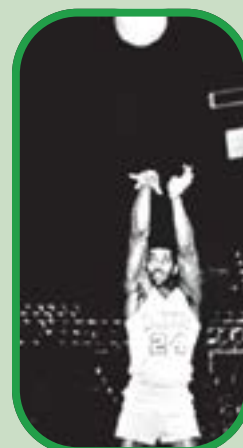
In 1980, David received a football scholarship offer from the University of Washington Huskies. In the Spring of 1980, the Toronto Blue Jays drafted him. After college David had the opportunity to try out with the San Diego Chargers, but a leg injury cut that dream short. Trimble started coaching at A.C. Davis in 1996 when his oldest son was a junior playing football and he has been on the Davis football and basketball coaching staff ever since.

PERSONAL & COMMUNITY

David Trimble has been fortunate to coach all 3 sons at A.C. Davis. When he isn't working or coaching, he spends his time with his 6 kids and 9 grandchildren. David believes and says, "One important thing in life is to be nice to people and treat them with respect because you never know when you will be the one that needs to be picked up." A great piece of advice from the person who is always ready for what life brings. READY, SET, PLAY! A PARENT'S GUIDE TO ATHLETIC READINESS FOR YOUR YOUNG CHILD

THE SEVEN SHIPS OF A STRONG COMMUNITY

I feel incredibly blessed to have grown up in Yakima surrounded by amazing coaches, mentors, teachers, journalists, and active parents who invested in my generation. Those experiences continue to shape how I view leadership today. Strong communities are not built by one person. They are built through what I call the "Seven Ships of Leadership."

First are PartnerSHIPS. Great things happen when schools, families, businesses, churches, nonprofits, and community leaders navigate together in the same direction. Student-athletes thrive when adults choose collaboration over competition.

Second is LeaderSHIP. Leadership is not about titles. It is about influence, service, and consistently showing up for others. Some of the greatest leaders quietly mentor students, support families, and encourage others behind the scenes.

Third is StewardSHIP. We all share responsibility for caring for the gifts, opportunities, and resources entrusted to us. Through volunteering, mentoring, and supporting youth programs, stewardship leaves a lasting impact.

Fourth is HardSHIP. Every child, family, and educator faces challenges. Hardship can divide us or strengthen us. In Yakima, I continue to witness resilience, grit, and compassion rise from difficult moments.

Fifth is FriendSHIP. Communities grow stronger when people genuinely care for one another beyond titles or organizations. Friendship builds trust, connection, and reminds people they matter.

But the two "ships" that may matter most are MentorSHIPS and RelationSHIPS. Research and life experience tell us the same thing: young people succeed when they feel connected to caring adults. A mentor can change a child's confidence, direction, and future through belief, consistency, and encouragement.

Hope grows when relationships grow. The future of our community depends on people willing to pour into the next generation like the

THE DECISION: MULTI-SPORT OR ELITE TEAM ATHLETICS

Should young athletes specialize in one sport early or diversify their sport experiences? Playing multiple sports can be controversial with coaches, health care professionals and parents. Recent research from 2024 and 2025 has identified benefits, mental and physical advantages, and found reasons why the multi-sport approach might be key to long-term success.

ADVANTAGES: Recent studies state that to build well-rounded athletes, the benefits of playing multiple sports are better than kids specializing in one single sport. A 2025 article in SportzWire states that playing varied sports builds resilience, with athletes showing 20-30% lower injury incidence due to cross-training different muscle groups.

A March 2025 article from Henry Ford Health stresses that multi-sport participation not only prevents burnout but also enhances overall athleticism. University Hospitals' 2024 blog agrees, noting, "reduced psychological stress, overuse injuries and improved adaptability" of youth with multi-sport participation. The Aspen Institute data states that psychologically, switching sports keeps things fresh, preventing the fatigue that drives 70% of kids to quit by age 13. In summary, multi-sport athletes tend to develop broader athletic foundations- reducing overuse injuries and promoting lifelong activity.

DISADVANTAGES: There are negatives to multi-sport participation because multi-sport kids might lag in sport-specific skills initially, potentially missing out on elite team selections or scholarships if coaches prioritize special talent.

CURRENT STATUS: Studies show 87% of Division 1 athletes and 90% of NFL draft picks played multiple sports in high school. Approximately 43% to 73% of high school athletes play at least two sports. However, the trend shows a steady decline in three-sports athletes as year-round club sports become more common.

SUMMARY While specialized sports have value for the elite athlete's development, evidence indicates multi-sport participation is best for most youth. Multi-sport participation comes down to the athlete's decision and family agreement. Schools can promote and cultivate an athlete's program that has high levels of cross-sport participation. The community is vital in supporting facilities, food, transportation, media, lodging and volunteers for competitions. A centrally located region with the attributes of athletes, schools and community has an unlimited future, in creating and sustaining success and fun for thousands of young athletes and their families.

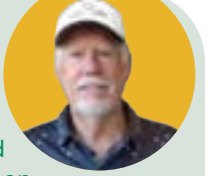

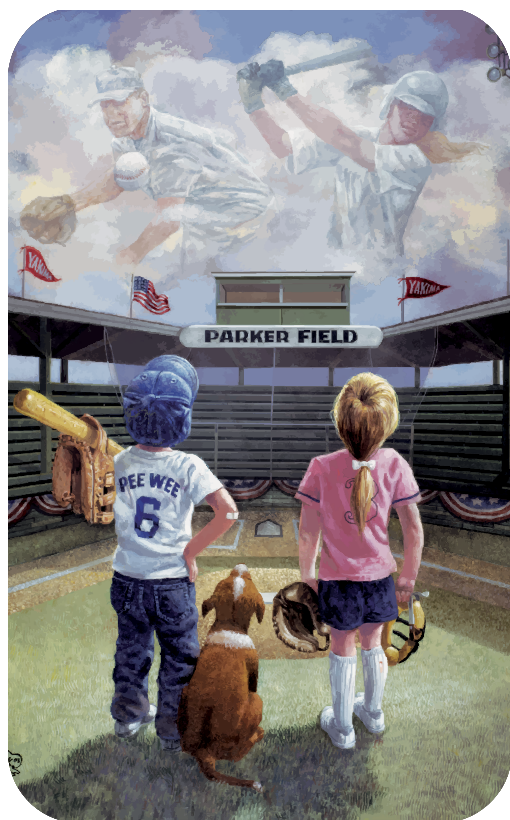

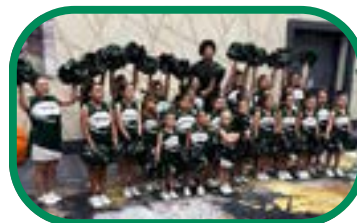
